## Portfolio Turnover

The Fund pays transaction costs, such as commissions, when it buys and sells securities (or "turns over" its portfolio). The Fund's portfolio turnover rate for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012 was 42%. High levels of portfolio turnover may indicate higher transaction costs and may result in higher taxes for you if your Fund shares are held in a taxable account. These costs, which are not reflected in Total Annual Fund Operating Expenses or in the Examples above, can adversely affect the Fund's investment performance.

## Principal Investment Strategies

The Fund seeks to achieve its investment objective by normally investing at least 80% of its net assets (plus borrowings made for investment purposes) in common stocks and other equity securities of companies that pay or are expected to pay dividends. Under normal conditions, the Fund will invest primarily in common stocks of companies with market capitalizations greater than \$3.5 billion. The portfolio managers use a value investing style focusing on companies whose securities the portfolio managers believe are undervalued. The portfolio managers partition the Fund's selection universe by industry and then identify what they believe to be undervalued securities in

each industry to determine potential holdings for the Fund representing a broad range of industry groups. The portfolio managers use quantitative factors to screen the Fund's selection universe, analyzing factors such as price momentum (*i.e.*, changes in security price relative to changes in overall market prices), earnings estimate revisions (*i.e.*, changes in analysts' earnings-per-share estimates) and fundamental changes. In addition, a portion of the securities selected for the Fund are identified primarily on the basis of their dividend yields. After narrowing the universe through a combination of qualitative analysis and fundamental research, the

portfolio managers select securities for the Fund. In addition to common stocks and other equity securities (such as preferred stocks, convertible securities and warrants), the Fund may invest in real

estate investment trusts (REITs) and in non-U.S. securities, including emerging market securities.



For Institutional Class, Class P and Administrative Class shares, the minimum initial investment in the Fund is \$1 million, though minimums may be modified for certain financial intermediaries that aggregate trades on behalf of investors. For Class D shares, the minimum initial investment in the Fund is \$1,000 and the minimum subsequent investment is \$50, though financial service firms offering these shares may impose different minimums.


